Fish 'n Ships Outreach Tool Testing

During the month of July 2025, we put out a call for volunteers to assist one of Lynne Shannon's visiting scientists, Nathalie Pulvermacher, in testing the outreach and educational tool: the Fish 'n' Ships Card Game. Over several sessions, volunteers joined Nathalie to play and evaluate the game, which was designed to educate participants about marine ecosystems and the sustainable management of ocean resources. The game provided a fun and accessible introduction to key concepts such as trophic levels, ecological pyramids, and the importance of effective fisheries management.

We would like to extend our sincere thanks to everyone who volunteered their time and energy to take part in the testing phase. Your feedback has been invaluable in helping Nathalie prepare her report on the tool and in shaping how it may be used in future outreach and educational settings.

Riesna Audh wins the IAPSO Eugene La Fond Medal

The Busan IAMAS-IACS-IAPSO 2025 Joint Assembly (BACO-25) took place in Busan, Republic of Korea, from 21-25 July 2025, bringing together global experts, early-career researchers, and students to address critical environmental challenges across atmospheric, oceanic, and cryospheric sciences. At the event, Riesna R. Audh from the South African Polar Research Infrastructure (SAPRI), hosted by the NRF-SAEON Egagasini Node, was awarded the prestigious IAPSO Eugene La Fond Medal. This award recognizes outstanding research by an ocean scientist from a developing country. Riesna presented her PhD research, which produced the first biogeochemical dataset for winter sea ice in the Atlantic sector of the Antarctic Marginal Ice Zone, challenging the longheld view that winter sea ice is biogeochemically inactive.

Her work, based on samples collected during the 2019 South African-led SCALExperiment winter cruise, used measurements of sea-ice structure, isotopes, macronutrients, and chlorophyll, combined with numerical modelling, to reveal active biogeochemical processes in growing winter sea ice. These findings highlight the role of dynamic growth in

shaping sea ice and advancing understanding of the polar regions. Riesna's recognition at BACO-25 not only affirms the value of her research but also showcases the contributions of South African scientists and early-career researchers from developing countries in closing critical knowledge gaps in polar science. Her full study was published in the Journal of Geophysical Research: Oceans (2023) and supported by the NRF, SANAP, and the EU's Horizon 2020 programme.

On behalf of UCT-MARIS, we would like to congratulate Riesna on this incredible accomplishment and for waving the South African flag high at this exciting international conference!

- Science (all qualifications) on Tuesday 9 September at 18h00pm.






South African Master of Ocean Sciences

In 2026, the UCT Master in Applied Ocean Sciences (AOS) program will serve as the pilot project for the <u>South African Master in Ocean Sciences (SAMOS)</u>, a project funded by the EU ERASMUS+ Capacity Building in Higher Education programme. The coursework structure will expand on the established AOS course, with the opportunity to benefit from the expertise of the universities and experts, drawn from across the South African marine landscape who are participating in SAMOS.

Applicants will register at and receive the degree from UCT, with most of the coursework component (approx 6 months) taking place at the Ocean Campus of the Nelson Mandela University, Gqeberha (Port Elizabeth), Eastern Cape. This exciting opportunity will allow for you to benefit from the wide range of ocean-expertise we have at the South African partner universities.

Government Notices

- The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) <u>seeks public comment</u> on the new <u>draft management plans for the Benguela Muds</u> and <u>Cape Canyon</u> Marine Protected Areas.
 These plans are key tools for the future management of the MPAs. Stakeholders have a 30-day period, starting from the date of the newspaper notice, to submit written feedback.
- In Government Gazette No. 53123, the Presidency calls for <u>nominations for Commissioners to serve</u> <u>a five-year term on the Presidential Climate Commission</u> (PCC). Suitably qualified South African citizens with expertise in environmental and socio-economic fields are invited to apply. The PCC advises on the country's climate change response and just transition. Nominations, including a CV and supporting documents, must be emailed to <u>nominations@climatecommission.org.za</u> by 16h00 on Friday, 29 August 2025.

Workshop: The Role of Marine Biology in Helping the Ocean Store Carbon
